




CISM team began providing supports in **2007** with the support of BCSARA and EMBC

Program components

- Certification of peers
- Annual on-going training
- Education and awareness sessions for the 80 SAR teams
 - Each team needs session once every 2-3 years
- Interventions
- Follow up







Certification

- Provided by International Critical Incident
 Stress Foundation instructors
- Two main courses:
 - ICISF Individual Crisis Intervention and Peer Support
 - Group Crisis Intervention training
- 4 days of initial training





Requirements to be a peer

- Active SAR volunteer for a minimum 1 year, preferably more*
- Be recommended by their SAR team and successfully interview with current CISM peers
- Complete initial training
- Probation for 1 year
 - must be active in monthly conference calls and in training
 - participate as observer and assistant during interventions
 - deliver education and awareness sessions
- Maintain training, deliver education/awareness sessions, active involvement in program

Current Members

 Currently 22 active peers; program uses ongoing recruitment and selection with a priority given to SAR volunteers who have ICISF training







Education & Awareness sessions

 Ideally happen every 2-3 years for each of the 80 SAR groups

- Each peer is given geographically appropriate teams to present to
- Best practices
 - Include spouses, partners, significant others in the presentation
 - Happen <u>after a new intake</u> of SAR volunteers critical
 - After a significant incident


Interventions

- ICISF trains peers with 6 main interventions
 - Defusings
 - 5 step debrief
 - 7 step debrief
 - 1 on 1 session
 - Crisis management briefing
 - Demobilization

FOLLOW UP IS PROVIDED ON A "AS NEEDED" BASIS FOR ALL GROUPS AND VOLUNTEERS




Statistics — breakdown of callouts 2015



- Increase in rescue calls involving serious injuries for the subject







JOHNSONS LANDING, B.C. - Rescuers have recovered the body of a third victim who died after her family's home was levelled by a huge landslide in a southeastern British Columbia community.

Coroner Lisa LaPointe said 17-year-old Rachel Webber's body was found around supper time Wednesday near the front of what had been her home in the hamlet of Johnsons Landing.

LaPointe thanked everyone involved in the search, including volunteers and a forensic analyst who pinpointed the best locations to search in a debris field that covers more than 32 hectares.

- As CISM requests come in, EMBC is willing to find a way to provide CISM support for SAR volunteers responding to situations outside the normal SAR mandate where volunteers are exposed to critical incident stress
- EMBC and CISM peers work collaboratively to provide additional mental health supports to volunteers when WorkSafe coverage is not available or directly attributed to a SAR task – ie external stressors subsequent to a task
